What is Policy Impact for Skills for Historians?

An innovative course designed for historians of any period led by academics and practitioners. Held at King's College London, January-May 2014, with ongoing support until year end for a cohort selected on performance and impact potential.

Who is eligible?

20 free places are available for historians from across King's College London, from final year PhD students to senior academics (from any department, institute or centre). 10 places are available to H&P network members on a fee-paying basis (£450pp).

What does it involve?

Three one-day workshops at King's College London:

1. Introduction to public policy engagement (22 Jan)
2. Public policy: practice and actors (26 Feb)
3. History in the headlines (14 May)

What would I gain?

A coherent understanding of the public policy-making process in Britain; the opportunities and challenges of intervening in that process; more confidence and skills to shape the public agenda; and enhanced capacity to complete a REF case study in future.
