David Simon attended the launch of the Let Them Return campaign for Chagos Islanders, chaired by Lord Eric Avebury at the House of Lords on 8th April. Following several court rulings in their favour (now being appealed to the Law Lords by the FCO), the campaign seeks to build support for the islanders to be permitted to return to the outer islands of the Chagos archipelago in the Indian Ocean from which they were expelled by the British government some 40 years ago ahead of the construction of the strategic US air base on Diego Garcia, the archipelago's largest island.

Grants and Awards

Nick Branch received a grant of £90K from the Irish Heritage Council to support collaborative archaeological research in Ireland, with Archaeological Development Services.

Tim Unwin and **Dorothea Kleine** are partners in a successful network bid under the EU's Edulink programme, which will combine ICT4D's existing Delphe funded African partnership with a similar scheme based in Finland and Scandinavia. RHUL are due to receive £95K from a total EU grant applied for of c.£360k.

Nick Branch and **Varyl Thorndycraft** have won an Archaeoscape contract with the Environment Agency, for research on flood relief management near Oxford, worth £8,500.

Bertie Mandelblatt, one of our recently-completed PhD students, has won a Stanford Visiting Scholarship worth \$2,500 to do research on French political economy at Stanford prior to taking up her SSHRC Postdoctoral Fellowship in Montreal.

Mary Dengler, **Vandana Desai** and **Alex Loftus** were successful in securing an ESRC 1+3 Case Studentship 2008 in collaboration with WaterAid London (Ms. Samantha French) and its Mali Regional Office (Mr. Nicolas Sidibe). The research entails improving water governance and reforms that have been initiated globally and have impact at the local level to meet the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) for Water and Sanitation. This studentship will be particularly focussing on the West African country of Mali and the region of Koulikoro.
