CONFERENCES-FIELDWORK-OVERSEAS

Ed Derbyshire visited UNESCO Headquarters in Paris , 7-8 October, for consultations with the Director of the Earth Science Division and the Section Chief of the Intergovernmental

Oceanographic Commission concerning various aspects of the International Year of Planet Earth.

Ed Derbyshire took part in a meeting of the Management Team of the International Year of Planet Earth on 14 October, by means of a telephone link with UNESCO Headquarters in Paris .

Ed Derbyshire visited the dust collection site (On Pico de la Gorra , 1930m asl) of the Facultad de Ciencias del Mar of the Universidad de Las Palmas on 22 October, at the invitation of Dra. Maria Dolores Gelado Caballero (Universidad de Gran Canaria) and Dr. José Joaquin Hernández Brito (Instituto Canario de Ciencias Marinas del Gobierno de Canarias), in order to examine the system and to agree on future collaboration on Sahara dust collection and analysis.
