Course specification for an undergraduate award

BSc Economics with Music (L1W1)

Section 1 – Introduction to your course

This course specification is a formal document, which provides a summary of the main features of your course and the learning outcomes that you might reasonably be expected to achieve and demonstrate if you take full advantage of the learning opportunities that are provided. Further information is contained in the College prospectus, and in various handbooks, all of which you will be able to access online. Your degree course in Economics with Music is delivered in three stages, each of which comprises one year of full-time study during which you must follow modules to the value of 120 credits. Those courses with a Year in Business are delivered in four stages with stage three consisting of work experience of between six and twelve months in an organisation or institution approved by the Economics Department as having a function relevant and suitable to the degree course. For stage three of the course you must take one module worth 30 credits.

The curriculum is based around a core of mandatory modules. Stage one provides a foundation for the later stages through a grounding in mathematical and statistical techniques, and in contemporary micro and macroeconomics, and some experience of the application of mathematics to formal economic argument. In stage two, you develop your core economic knowledge further and use increasingly sophisticated analytic methods. Students following Single Honours and some Combined Honours Degree courses with Economics as a major component also develop their statistical and econometric skills further at this stage. In stage three, most students have the option to research and write an extended essay. You also select specialist options which provide the opportunity to learn how the general theory and methods you have acquired can be applied in areas which are of specific interest to you.

While Royal Holloway keeps all the information made available under review, courses and the availability of individual modules, especially optional modules are necessarily subject to change at any time, and you are therefore advised to seek confirmation of any factors which might affect your decision to follow a specific course. In turn, Royal Holloway will inform you as soon as is practicable of any significant changes which might affect your studies. For joint and combined honours courses, please refer to the course specification for your secondary department's corresponding single honours course for further information on educational aims, and learning outcomes.

The following is brief description for some of the most important terminology for understanding the content of this document:

Degree course – May also be referred to as 'degree programme' or simply 'programme', these terms refer to the qualification you will be awarded upon successful completion of your studies.

Module – May also be referred to as 'course', this refers to the individual units you will study each year to complete your degree course. Undergraduate degrees at Royal Holloway comprise a combination of modules in multiples of 15 credits to the value of 120 credits per year. On some degree courses a certain number of optional modules must be passed for a particular degree title.

This table sets out the most important information for the mandatory modules on your degree course. These modules are central to achieving your learning outcomes, so they are compulsory, and all students on your degree course will be required to take them. You will be automatically registered for these modules each year. Mandatory modules fall into two categories; 'condonable' or 'non-condonable'.

In the case of mandatory 'non-condonable' (MNC) modules, you must pass the module before you can proceed to the next year of your course, or to successfully graduate with a particular degree title. In the case of mandatory 'condonable' (MC) modules, these must be taken but you can still progress or graduate even if you do not pass them. Please note that although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, changes to your degree course may be made where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events. For example; where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of external advisors, to enhance academic provision.

*Contact hours come in various different forms, and may take the form of time spent with a member of staff in a lecture or seminar with other students. Contact hours may also be laboratory or, studio-based sessions, project supervision with a member of staff, or discussion through a virtual learning environment (VLE). These contact hours may be with a lecturer or teaching assistant, but they may also be with a technician, or specialist support staff. It is intended that these contact hours will be face-to-face as far as possible, but in certain unavoidable situations, these may take place virtually.

**The way in which each module on your degree course is assessed will also vary, however, the assessments listed above are all 'summative', which means you will receive a mark for it which will count towards your overall mark for the module, and potentially your degree classification, depending on your year of study. On successful completion of the module you will gain the credits listed. 'Coursework' might typically include a written assignment, like an essay. Coursework might also include a report, dissertation or portfolio. 'Practical assessments' might include an oral assessment or presentation, or a demonstration of practical skills required for the particular module.

3.2 Optional modules

In addition to mandatory modules, there will be a number of optional modules available during the course of your degree. The following table lists a selection of optional modules that are likely to be available. However, not all may be available every year. Although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, new options may be offered or existing ones may be withdrawn. For example; where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events, where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies (PSRBs) have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of External Advisors, to enhance academic provision. There may be additional requirements around option selection, so it is important that this specification is read alongside your department's Student Handbook, which you can access via their [webpage](#).

3.3 Optional module requirements		
The curriculum in Music is as follows: Students on Required Intensive Theory entry must take: MU1110 Theory and Analysis (15 credits) (mandatory condonable) MU1111 Fundamentals of Music Theory (15 credits) (mandatory condonable) All other students must take: MU1110 Theory and Analysis (15 credits) (mandatory condonable) And choose one further 15 credit module from: List A MU1112 Creative Composition Techniques (15 credits) MU1113 Practical Composition Skills (15 credits) List B MU1114 A Very Short History of Music (15 credits) MU1115 Introduction to Historical Musicology (15 credits) List C MU1116 Introduction to World Music (15 credits) MU1117 Contemporary Debates in Music (15 credits) In Year 2, for Music you choose module(s) to the value of 30 credits drawn from intermediate (I) and honours (H) level modules. In Year 3, for Economics you take options to the value of 90 credits from a range of modules offered by the department, and specified modules in the minor subject. EC3400 Extended Essay is subject to the successful completion of a preliminary report being submitted at the end of the autumn term. Those failing this will be asked to complete two additional 15 credit modules in the spring term. In Year 3, for Music, you choose module(s) to the value of 30 credits drawn from intermediate (I) and honours (H) level modules. Note: (i) Modules in performance with attached instrumental/vocal lessons are not available in Combined Honours courses with Music as the minor component. (ii) The permitted maxima of honours (H) and intermediate (I) level modules in stages two and three respectively are subject to the approval of the Department of the major component. (iii) The substitution of 'elective' module(s) within stages two and three is drawn on the major component and is subject to the approval of the Department concerned.		

(iv) Prerequisites may apply to optional modules.

Section 4 - Progressing through each year of your degree course

All first year students on single, joint or combined honours courses offered all or in part by the School of Humanities, School of Performing and Digital Arts, or department of Politics, International Relations and Philosophy are required to pass a Moodle-based writing skills quiz in order to progress into the second year of study. The pass mark for the test is 60%. Certificates of Distinction are awarded to students who achieve at least 80% in the quiz. Students may attempt the quiz as often as they wish with no penalties or capping. Students who meet the requirements for progression as stipulated in the [College's Undergraduate Regulations](#) (Section: Conditions for progression to the next stage) but fail to pass the Moodle-based quiz will not be permitted to progress into their second year of academic study at the College.

Section 5 – Educational aims of the course

The aims of this course are:

- to provide training in the principles of economics and their application appropriate to the type of degree concerned;
- to stimulate you intellectually through the study of economics and to lead you to appreciate its application to a range of problems and its relevance in a variety of contexts;
- to develop your ability to apply the knowledge and skills you have acquired to the solution of theoretical and/or applied problems in economic policy;
- to equip you with appropriate tools of analysis to tackle issues and problems of economic policy;
- to develop in you, through the study of economics, a range of transferable skills that will be of value in employment and self-employment;
- to provide you with analytical skills and an ability to develop simplifying frameworks for studying the real world and to be able to appreciate what would be an appropriate level of abstraction for a range of economic issues;
- to provide you with the knowledge and skill base from which you can proceed to further studies in Economics and related areas.

Section 6 - Course learning outcomes

Section 7 - Teaching, learning and assessment
Teaching is mostly by means of lectures and seminars, the latter generally providing a forum for students, with the support of their instructors, to work through problem sets and applications in a smaller and more interactive setting. Learning is through participation in lectures and seminars, designated reading and completion of problem sets and online exercises. Essays and short written answers ensure that the skills of exposition and critique are developed and evaluated. At the end of the course and if the extended essay is undertaken, most students will apply the knowledge and skills they have acquired in the conduct of a piece of original research under the close supervision of a member of staff. It is expected that students with an interest in research will develop the relevant skills for future use. Assessment of knowledge and understanding is typically by formal, unseen written examination, although continuous assessment in the form of unseen tests features in the assessment of a number of modules. Full details of the assessments for individual modules can be obtained from the Department.
