

# Royal Holloway, University of London Course specification for an undergraduate award BSc (Econ) Economics and Data Science (L140)

#### Section 1 – Introduction to your course

This course specification is a formal document, which provides a summary of the main features of your course and the learning outcomes that you might reasonably be expected to achieve and demonstrate if you take full advantage of the learning opportunities that are provided. Further information is contained in the College prospectus, and in various handbooks, all of which you will be able to access online. Your degree course in BSc (Econ) Economics and Data Science is delivered in three stages, each of which comprises one year of full-time study during which the student must follow modules to the value of 120 credits.

The curriculum is based around a core of mandatory modules. Stage one provides a foundation for the later stages through a grounding in mathematical and statistical techniques, and in contemporary micro and macroeconomics, and some experience of the application of mathematics to formal economic argument. In stage two, students develop their core economic knowledge further and use increasingly sophisticated analytic methods. Students also develop their statistical and data science skills further at this stage. In stage three, most students have the option to research and write an extended essay. Students also select specialist options which provide the opportunity to learn how the general theory and methods they have acquired can be applied in areas which are of specific interest to them.

While Royal Holloway keeps all the information made available under review, courses and the availability of individual modules, especially optional modules are necessarily subject to change at any time, and you are therefore advised to seek confirmation of any factors which might affect your decision to follow a specific course. In turn, Royal Holloway will inform you as soon as is practicable of any significant changes which might affect your studies.

The following is a brief description for some of the most important terminology for understanding the content of this document:

Degree course – May also be referred to as 'degree programme' or simply 'programme', these terms refer to the qualification you will be awarded upon successful completion of your studies.

*Module* – May also be referred to as 'course', this refers to the individual units you will study each year to complete your degree course. Undergraduate degrees at Royal Holloway comprise a combination of modules in multiples of 15 credits to the value of 120 credits per year. On some degree courses a certain number of optional modules must be passed for a particular degree title.

This table sets out the most important information for the mandatory modules on your degree course. These modules are central to achieving your learning outcomes, so they are compulsory, and all students on your degree course will be required to take them. You will be automatically registered for these modules each year. Mandatory modules fall into two categories: 'condonable' or 'non-condonable'.



In the case of mandatory 'non-condonable' (MNC) modules, you must pass the module before you can proceed to the next year of your course, or to successfully graduate with a particular degree title. In the case of mandatory 'condonable' (MC) modules, these must be taken but you can still progress or graduate even if you do not pass them. Please note that although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, changes to your degree course may be made where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events. For example: where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of external advisors, to enhance academic provision.

## 3.2 Optional modules

In addition to mandatory modules, there will be a number of optional modules available during the course of your degree. Although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, new options may be offered or existing ones may be withdrawn. For example where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events, where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies (PSRBs) have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of External Advisors, to enhance academic provision. There may be additional requirements around option selection; please contact the Department for further information.

In Year 3 you must choose optional modules to the value of 120 credits from the stage 3 modules offered by the Department (see section 3.2 for a selection of optional modules that may be available). When making your selection, it is a requirement that you take:

i) at least 30 credits from the following *Statistical Inference Basket*:

- EC3133 Advanced Econometrics 1 (15 credits);
- EC3233 Advanced Econometrics 2 (15 credits, EC3133 is a pre-requisite);
- EC3335 Financial Econometrics with Data Science (15 credits);
- EC3367 Time Series for Macroeconomics with Data Science (15 credits, EC2401 is a pre-requisite),

## AND

ii) at least 30 credits of modules from the following *Data Science Basket*:

- EC3364 Web-Scraping and Internet-Based Data Collection (15 credits, EC2401 is a pre-requisite);
- EC3365 Data Presentation and Visualisation (15 credits, EC2401 is a pre-requisite);
- EC3366 Machine Learning and Data Mining (15 credits, EC2401 is a pre-requisite);
- EC3367 Time Series for Macroeconomics with Data Science (15 credits, EC2401 is a pre-requisite).



### Section 4 - Progressing through each year of your degree course

Progression throughout the year/s is monitored through performance in summative or formative coursework assignments. Please note that if you hold a Student Visa and you choose to leave (or are required to leave because of non-progression) or complete early (before the course end date stated on your CAS), then this will be reported to UKVI.

All first-year undergraduate students are required to take and pass the non-credit bearing Moodle-based Academic Integrity module SS1001 to progress into the second year of study (unless their course includes the alternative mandatory SS1000 module). The pass mark for the module assessment is stated in the on-line Academic Integrity Moodle module. Students may attempt the assessment as often as they wish with no penalties or capping. Students who meet the requirements for progression as stipulated in the <u>College's Undergraduate</u> <u>Regulations</u> (Section: Conditions for progression to the next stage) but fail to pass the Moodle-based Academic Integrity module will not be permitted to progress into their second year of academic study at the College

#### Section 5 – Educational aims of the course

The aims of this course are:

- to provide training in the principles of economics and to develop an understanding of econometric skills so as to perform the analyse of data in an economic framework;
- to stimulate students intellectually through the study of economics and econometrics and to lead them to appreciate their application to a range of problems;
- to develop in students the ability to apply the knowledge and skills they have acquired to the solution of theoretical and in particular applied problems in economic policy;
- to equip students with appropriate tools for analysing data so as to inform economic policy;
- to develop, through the study of economics and econometrics, a range of transferable skills that will be of value in employment and self-employment;
- to provide students with analytical skills and an ability to develop simplifying frameworks for studying the real world;
- to provide students with the knowledge and skill base from which they can proceed to further studies in Economics and Econometrics or related areas.

Teaching and learning in the course are closely informed by the active research of staff. Teaching is mostly by means of lectures and seminars, the latter generally providing a forum for students, with the support of their instructors, to work through problem sets and applications in a smaller and more interactive setting. Learning is through participation in lectures and seminars, designated reading and completion of problem sets and online exercises. Essays and short written answers ensure that the skills of exposition and critique are developed and evaluated. At the end of the course and if the extended essay is undertaken, most students will apply the knowledge and skills they have acquired in the conduct of a piece of original research under the close supervision of a member of staff. It is expected that students with an interest in research will develop the relevant skills for future use. Assessment of knowledge and understanding is typically by formal, unseen written examination, although continuous assessment in the form of unseen tests features in the assessment of a number of modules.

Contact hours come in various forms and may take the form of time spent with a member of staff in a lecture or seminar with other students. Contact hours may also be laboratory or, studio-based sessions, project supervision with a member of staff, or discussion through a virtual learning environment (VLE). These contact hours may be with a lecturer or teaching assistant, but they may also be with a technician, or specialist support staff.

The way in which each module on your degree course is assessed will also vary, however, the assessments listed above are all 'summative', which means you will receive a mark for it which will count towards your overall mark for the module, and potentially your degree classification, depending on your year of study. On successful completion of the module you will gain the credits listed. 'Coursework' might typically include a written assignment, like an essay. Coursework might also include a report, dissertation or portfolio. 'Practical assessments' might include an oral assessment or presentation, or a demonstration of practical skills required for the particular module
